


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# BUT SHOULD LIGHT OUR PATHS TO THE FUTURE

To the memory of Rev. Thomas Mills, who from 1838 when he received his license to preach, through the years until his death in 1873, gave unselfishly of himself. He always seemed to be there when he was needed.

To the memory of John Lanning the clerk from 1833 to 1873. He kept records and added enough details to make the history a living memory. I feel I have become acquainted with some of the people through his records.

### TO THOSE WHO READ THIS HISTORY ...

1981 will be remembered as the year we built our new church. As an indication of our commitment to the ongoing cause of Christ in this community and in celebration of over one hundred and fifty years continuous witness in this place, a new building is being erected. But it is obvious that the Plains Church is more than a building.

It is people who meet frequently to worship a benevolent Being, other than and greater than themselves. We have chosen to live our lives in His environment. We affirm our commitment to God-centred living by sharing public and intentional worship experiences. These celebrations of life centre on Him who is a life-giving, life-sharing, life-enjoying God.

It is people who need companionship, who need to belong to others, who value relationships that express caring and are supportive. We weep with each other in times of trouble; we laugh and joke and enjoy one another's happiness. Our church is small enough that everyone can know everybody else.

It is people, committed to serve each other and the wider community in the conviction that faith without works is dead. Our love must find expression in deeds of kindness. Our program is simple, our budget modest. Instead of expending a great deal of energy just to maintain the machinery of the local church, we are freer to respond to the real needs of the people in this area.

It is people who believe that prayer is an appropriate response to life. We know that it is healthy for us to be open and honest with God in our expression of thoughts 6

and feelings; that we can pray about anything and everything. Prayer brings forgiveness. It inspires a new hope and courage.

It is people who are committed to <u>learn</u> and grow, and who are open to change. Biblical knowledge, an acquaint-ance with the history of the Christian church, a realization that theology is faith seeking understanding, a passion to be both human and holy - these things necessitate that we will always be disciples, committed to learning.

By his life, death and resurrection, Jesus Christ demonstrated the potential of human life lived in relation to God. In offering us salvation, He promises a life with meaning and without guilt, a life of love, hope and joy; a life in which relationships are highly prized.

My favourite definition of the church is that it is not a museum or an art gallery in which prize exhibits are on display. It is a workshop in which the Master Carpenter of Nazareth is busily at work, moulding the lives of men and women to greater beauty and usefulness.

At this point in our history we are more conscious than ever of the heritage which is ours both locally and as an expression of the universal church of Jesus Christ. With enthusiasm and quiet resolve, we pledge to do our best to live as the people of God in this neighbourhood, and so to commend the life of faith to succeeding generations.

### THE OAK PLAINS

A ridge of land, covered with stately pines stretched for several miles across the southern part of Yarmouth Township, sloping down to a peaceful plain that stretched for four miles south to Lake Erie. The plain was covered with trees, many of which were giant oaks. The creeks which wound their way through the countryside teemed with fish. Wild animals roamed through the bush. The only roads were the paths Indians had made through the dense forest.

This was the land the early pioneers came to shortly after 1810 when the first settlers arrived in this township.

It was on the Oak Plain that this little church had it's beginnings, and from it took it's name; "The Plains" - "First Regular Baptist Church in Yarmouth".

When the first settlers arrived in the area their needs were many, including; shelter, food, schooling for their children and religion. Religious services started soon after their arrival. Anderson Montross was one of the early Baptist settlers. The first Baptist meeting was held in his home. His arrival dates back to 1816 when he settled on Lot 6, Concession 5, Yarmouth Township.

I believe the Baptist settlers also met in a little log school built on the lot where "The Plains - First Yarmouth Baptist Church" is now located, as this was the centre of activity in the area.

The congregation began to grow and on the 13th of November, 1830 it became a branch of the Iona or First South-wold Baptist Church, this being the nearest established Baptist church in the area.

During the year 1832, an outbreak of cholera was brought in by the boats to Port Stanley. A Doctor Hawkins, who lived across from the school and helped to attend the sick, contracted the disease and died. His wife and several others were also stricken. They were taken to the little log school where they were cared for. She and several others died. They burned the school and doctor's home, and it is said that 8

the people of the neighbourhood were so frightened of the dread disease that they went miles out of their way to avoid the corner for some time.

It became a separate church on March 10th, 1833.

In the year 1835 the congregation met at a school near William Yorke's on Lot 8, Concession 5, Yarmouth Township. By the year 1838 they were meeting at what was known as the Baptist Meeting-House. The exact date the building was erected is not known. According to the early minutes, which were few and far between, it was built between 1835 and 1838.

This little church served well the people of the church and the community.

It is difficult for us to relate to these early settlers whose prize possessions were iron kettles, steamer trunks and feather ticks, who took six to eight weeks to cross the ocean, whose nearest neighbours lived several miles away, whose only roads were trails through the dense forest. The desperate loneliness that often accompanied them was a little less pronounced when they were able to attend their church. The church became the centre of their lives. Many others, not of the Baptist persuasion, were married and buried by their pastors.

Difficulties arose during the early years of the church. Church trials were a common practice. The Baptist churches were no exception. Sometimes, it actually seemed that the church kept law and order. Many church trials were held. People were brought to trial for such offences as dancing, fighting, not keeping the Sabbath and leaving the country without paying their debts. In one case a man was brought to trial for giving two deeds for the same property.

It is with much love and admiration that we look back into the lives of these pioneers who helped to build a settlement out of the wilderness. These faithful members established the first Baptist congregation in Yarmouth Township, and from these roots other Baptist churches were formed in this Township.

### SOME OF THE FOUNDERS OF THE CHURCH

RICHARD LANNING of Newton, New Jersey and his wife the former Eva Johnson of York County, New Brunswick settled in Vittoria, Ontario. They were on the original list of members of the Baptist church there. Richard was one of the deacons of that church. Eva died in 1822.

In 1824, Richard transferred his ownership of land to his wife's parents, with the understanding that they would raise his younger son Coville. It is believed that Richard moved to Yarmouth at that time. John, the older son of Richard, must have stayed in the Vittoria area as he taught school there in 1830. He moved to Yarmouth by 1833.

In 1833, Richard of Yarmouth married Mary Griffin of Malahide. Coville joined the family in Yarmouth at the age of seventeen. For five years he helped his father clear his land then returned to the Long Point area. He returned to Yarmouth in 1856 with his wife the former Catherine Jane Dedrick.

Richard was one of the founders of the Yarmouth Baptist Church. During the year 1832, an attempt was made by members of the church to resolve a grievance between Richard and William Powell. A disagreement over a kettle which Richard had sold to Mr. Powell occurred. When payment was denied and the church did not act upon it, Richard took the matter to court. The congregation felt he should not have sued a member of the church.

At this time a person could not take communion if they were not in accordance with other members of the congregation. Richard and William agreed to try to settle their disagreement.

In 1834 a meeting was held, probably in the Vittoria area, to try and resolve a difference between Richard and the First Yarmouth Church. The meeting opened with singing and a prayer by Simon Mabee. Deacon Laurence Johnson was chosen as moderator and John Lanning as clerk. After a considerable discussion on the subject of the grievance between Richard

Lanning and the First Regular Baptist Church in Yarmouth, it was agreed upon unanimously, that if the said church and the said Brother Lanning could forgive each other, they could forgive also.

Richard had two grievances with the church:

First: They would not act upon the debt owed to him by Mr. William Powell.

Second: The Temperance Society had become active in the area and many members of the church joined. Some of these people ridiculed others who would not join, calling them drunks. Richard in reply said that people should be moderate in all things.

Richard's name was never mentioned again in the church minutes. His second wife, Mary, and his two sons were members of the church. It is said that Richard purchased a tombstone, had it engraved, and it stood at the foot of his bed for ten years previous to his demise. He is buried beside a 'wee grandson' in the Seminary Burying Grounds.

ANDERSON MONTROSS was born in Philipstown, Putnam County, New York on May 21st, 1774. His first three years were spent in the United States about the time of the American Revolution. His parents were sympathetic to the British cause and took refuge on Long Island. In 1783, the family left Long Island and travelled by ship to St. John, New Brunswick.

In 1785, the family was living on a farm near Fredericton. Anderson bought a farm in New Brunswick in 1797. He married Rebecca Newcomb the daughter of a loyalist. They had ten children, the first being born in 1800.

In 1801, Anderson and Rebecca followed Anderson's parents to Ontario, settling first in the Long Point area. He purchased a 40 acre tract of land near Vittoria for 550. In 1816 they moved to Yarmouth, and he supplemented his farm income by teaming between London and Port Stanley. The first Baptist meeting in the area was held in his home. Anderson was chosen a deacon in 1835 and served until his death in 1847.

On March 9th, 1833, a council consisting of delegates from Malahide, Bayham, Walsingham and the Charlotteville churches, met to determine if a church should be organized in Yarmouth.

Southwold Church was agreed that a separate church should so be organized.

### THE PASTORS

Pre, 1833, Elder McDermand, a saddlebag preacher ministered to many of the early Baptist congregations in the area. John L. Lanning (nephew of John Lanning, church clerk 1833 - 1873) told of Elder McDermand in his history of the church for the 100th Anniversary.

The following is taken from a 1931 newspaper clipping:-

"Elder McDermand was born near Iona, who, though he could not read or write, understood Christian doctrines and knew how to teach them. During his early days as a preacher he was forced to call upon those who could read, to read the scriptures and the text during his services. However, he married a school teacher who soon taught him how to read, and with this handicap removed, he was able to branch out in his field of work."

FOLLOWING IS A LIST OF THE PASTORS TAKEN FROM CHURCH MINUTES:

- 10 Mar. 1833 Elder Baker preached the first sermon (when they became a church from a branch). Elder Merrill gave the charge. Elder McDermand gave the right hand of fellowship and Elder Ryersee preached the concluding sermon.
- 10 May 1835 Jesse Crandall was ordained.
- 2 June 1838 (They voted to give Thomas Mills "Licence to improve his gifts as the Lord may be graciously pleased to direct").
- 7 Apr. 1842 Elder Mills was given the authority to baptize.
  7 Feb. 1844 Elder Mills to have charge of the congregation half time for b25 with an additional b5 for the time past.
  (He continued until 29 Aug. 1844 when he asked for his letter
- (He continued until 29 Aug. 1844 when he asked for his letter of recommendation and dismission).
- 24 Apr. 1847 Moved that Elder Mills be released of his duties until 1 Jan. 1848 when Elder Mills shall labour with us half his time for year 1848. (He remained with them through

- 1849).
- 26 Apr. 1850 Elder Baker and Elder Mills to be paid according to proportion upon which they may agree.
- 31 May 1856 Request Elder S. McConnell to labour as minister. (He preached his first sermon 29 June 1856).
- 5 July 1856 Elder Mills, pleased with the pastoral care of the church, requested letters of recommendation and dismission for both he and his wife to travel to destitute places.
- 20 July 1856 Elder A. Smith preached. (Also four weeks previous).
- 4 Apr. 1857 Vote passed for Elder Mills to devote half of his time in the church for the year 1857.
- 26 Nov. 1857 Moved and seconded that Elder Mills continue until May 1858.
- 10 Apr. 1858 Resolved that we are willing to support Elder Mills as pastor of our church for the ensuing year until May 1859.
- 12 Aug. 1858 Proposed to send invitation to some minister to come and pay us a visit with a prospect of employing him to preach, as Elder Mills resigning. (They decided to invite Rev. William Gonne of Tyrconnel).
- 29 Aug. 1858 William Gonne visited according to request.
- 2 Oct. 1858 Elder William Gonne united with us by letter from the Harwich Church. (Elder Gonne was minister until May 1860).
- 26 May 1860 Elder D. W. Rowland was invited to preach one-quarter time for one year. Elder A. Smith to labour with us as a minister part-time. (Elder Isaac J. Rice also preached frequently at the end of the year).
- 21 Jan. 1861 A call was sent to Elder Gostelow he did not respond. (Elder Isaac J. Rice seemed to be their mainstay during the year).
- 24 Sept.1861 Moved by E. Scott and seconded by N. VanBuskirk that the church employ Elder Rice to preach as long as the church and him can agree.

- 3 May 1863 Agreed to give Elder Rice a letter of dismission to preach at Bayham and Port Burwell. (Elders Gonne, Mills and Rowland presided over the ministerial affairs of the church).
- 22 Nov. 1864 Brother John Treneman, a licentate, preached.
- 6 Jan. 1865 It was moved and seconded that Brother John Treneman be employed from Blenheim Church, for the term of one year.
- 16 Feb. 1865 John Treneman was ordained.
- 1 Oct. 1865 Asked Rev. Treneman to stay as pastor for 1866.
- 18 Dec. 1866 Pastor Treneman resigned.
- 5 Jan. 1867 (Arrangement made for Elder Mills and Elder Gonne to preach until they were able to replace Rev. Treneman).
- 5 Feb. 1867 (They were requested to continue to labour with us until 1 June 1867").
- 2 Mar. 1867 Elder Mills appointed to have care of the church until 1 June 1867.
- 7 May 1867 Decided to employ Elder Mills and Elder Gonne for the remainder of the year.
- 3 Dec. 1867 Decided to ask Elder Mills and Elder Smith to act as pastors alternately for 1868. They agreed.
- 10 Nov. 1868 Moved and seconded that we have a change in our ministry when the present term expires. Moved and seconded that Elder Thomas Mills, be, and act, as assistant to the pastor of the church when necessary, he being an aged resident in the church of long continuance, and that he be suitably rewarded for his services during the ensuing years. (A call was then sent to Elder C. Perrin).
- 5 Dec. 1868 Received a letter from Rev. C. Perrin that he cannot engage with us at present.
- 29 Dec. 1868 Moved and seconded that we engage Elder Thomas Mills for the ensuing six months providing he consents.
- 22 June 1869 A call was sent to Rev. A. McDonald to come and pay us a visit and preach to us in view of labouring with us for a time, and that his expenses be paid.

- 24 July 1869 A telegraphic despatch was received from Rev. A. McDonald. By reason of sickness in the family he could not attend his appointment.
- 1 Aug. 1869 Rev. A. McDonald preached at the meeting-house and in the afternoon at S.S. #13. A meeting was held, afterwhich, the ordinance of baptism was attended to.
- 15 Aug. 1869 Moved to endeavour to obtain the services of Rev. A. McDonald as pastor for a year, salary \$500., in anticipation of his services being rendered at different places throughout the present limits, boundaries and call of the church.
- 29 Aug. 1869 Rev. Alexander McDonald accepted to start on the 1st October, 1869.
- 1 Feb. 1870 (Again mention made to have Rev. Thomas Mills act as assistant, "as occasion shall require", and that he should be suitably rewarded).
- 16 Aug. 1870 Moved and seconded that the church make the effort to retain the present pastor Rev. A. McDonald for the ensuing year commencing 1 Oct. 1870.
- 3 Sept.1870 Moved and seconded that the pastor's salary be raised.
- 29 Aug. 1871 Moved and seconded that we retain the pastor Rev. A. McDonald for another year at the same rate, but be more prompt at the end of each quarter.
- 1 June 1872 Abigail E. McDonald, wife of Rev. A. McDonald died and was buried at Mt. Elgin.
- 23 Feb. 1873 Rev. Thomas Mills died.
- 8 Mar. 1873 Rev. Alexander McDonald tendered his resignation preparatory to go as a missionary to the Red River territory. His resignation consented to by the church, although it was with reluctance to part with him, but duty in such cause should be preferable to our personal feelings and desires. (He became the first pastor of First Baptist Church, Winnipeg 1875 1882, and served as a pioneer Baptist missionary to Western Canada).

- 11 Mar. 1873 A call was sent to Brother Haycock to pay us a visit. He did not attend.
- 18 May 1873 It is expected that Rev. A. McDonald will take his departure from here 21 May 1873. (D. S. McEwan filled in between pastors).
- 5 Jan. 1874 Rev. J. Lince accepted the pastorate of the church.
- 6 May 1875 Moved and seconded that Mr. Robertson be hired as pastor for this year.
- 1875 Call sent to Mr. Treneman to preach in this church. Elder Robertson to be given \$2. a sermon. Application not received by Rev. Robertson. Moved and seconded that word be sent to Elder Smith to resume appointments until a resident pastor obtained.
- 1 July 1875 Resolved that we give Brother Story a call to be our pastor, and offer \$300. for one part of his salary, and that we further agree to unite with the Sparta Church to make him a donation.
- 1 Sept.1875 Elder Story commenced his services with this church.
- 20 Sept.1875 Moved and seconded that Elder Smith be paid out of funds raised by the tea meeting.
- 25 Jan. 1876 Donation to Elder Story \$29.99.
- 15 Aug. 1876 Elder Story made a proposition to the church. The church has had one year's experience of his pastoral labours, with it agreed to continue these labours for another year for the consideration of \$260. in cash, the proceeds of a tea meeting and a donation to be given by the church.
- 27 Aug. 1876 Elder Story's proposition accepted.
- 8 May 1877 Resolved to endeavour to engage Brother McLauren to be our pastor at \$250., and more if we can, to assist the Sparta Church. Resolved to pay Elder Smith \$4. for two ministerial visits.
- 8 June 1879 Brother D. Laing to commence pastoral labours on 8 June 1879. (According to Sparta history Rev. Douglas Laing resigned in 1882).

- 6 June 1879 \*Rev. Harryette of Jamaica was the next pastor and was ordained at the Sparta Church in January 1883. His pastorate ended a few months after the ordination. \*(This excerpt from Sparta History no mention of Rev. Harryette was made in the Plain's minutes).
- 3 July 1883 Incoming pastor Brother D.B. Davidson.
- 21 Jan. 1886 Moved that we pay Pastor D.B. Davidson \$35. of the \$45. due him for pastoral duties.
- 16 May 1886 Moved and seconded we invite Elder Rowland to supply our pulpit.
- 20 Jan. 1887 Pastor Richard Marshall began his duties as pastor. A unanimous vote of thanks was given to Elder Rowland for supplying.
- 15 Sept.1889 Mr. Marshall's resignation was accepted.
- 15 Dec. 1889 Mr. Sowerby was the supply pastor.
- 2 Jan. 1890 Moved and seconded to pay Mr. Marshall full amount due him.
- 8 May 1890 A vote was taken unanimous that Brother J.H. Sowerby be pastor of this church at \$300. per year.
- 19 Apr. 1891 The pastor, Brother J.H. Sowerby, tendered his resignation.
- 21 June 1891 Considered hiring John Gray as pastor.
- 6 Sept.1891 Brother John Gray began his pastorate.
- 28 Feb. 1893 Moved by John McCandless and seconded by George Smith that the clerk notify Pastor Gray to discontinue the service in the church after Sabbath next.
- 22 Mar. 1894 Agreement made between Sparta and the Plains re; hiring a pastor.
- 8 Apr. 1894 A call given G.B. Davis to preach at \$300. a year. A vote was taken to raise the salary by \$25.
- 6 May 1894 G.B. Davis began his pastorate. (Sparta's records state he resigned in 1896).
- May 1896 Rev. J.J. Baker became pastor.
- 4 Aug. 1901 Pastor Baker tendered his resignation to take effect 16 Sept. 1901.

- 11 Aug. 1901 (Supply pastors were Rev. Fathergill, Rev. Reekie and Pastor Kirkpatrick.
- Dec. 1901 Rev. Kirkpatrick took over pastoral care of the church.
- 2 July 1902 (Pastor granted a vacation of one month to gain strength. His health did not improve. They depended on supply ministers for several months).
- 9 Sept.1902 Pastor Scott of Dutton preached the Anniversary service. (Pastor Kirkpatrick's health did not improve. He made several attempts to take up the work without success, and on Dec. 3, 1902, the clerk received a letter addressing the deacons tendering his resignation. The church tarried after service to consider the resignation and it was moved and seconded that it be accepted, to take effect 31 Dec. 1902.)
- 4 Jan. 1903 Our pulpit was supplied by Mr. F. Scott.
- 11 Jan. 1903 Mr. Reekie occupied our pulpit. (Others also supplied).
- 1 Feb. 1903 Announcement was made that Brother Reekie had accepted the call to Sparta and the Plains commencing 8 Feb. 1903.
- 9 May 1909 Our pastor the Rev. W.P. Reekie, much to our grief, tendered his resignation. It was moved and seconded that it be accepted. (He accepted a call from a church in Newburn, Saskatchewan. June 6, 1909 he preached his farewell sermon).
- 10 Oct. 1909 A call was extended to Rev. A. Ede St.Delmas.
- Sept.1913 A call was extended to Rev. Westel.
- 5 Oct. 1913 Rev. W. Westel started his pastorate.
- 16 Sept.1917 Rev. W. Westel resigned and preached his farewell sermon.
- 28 Oct. 1917 A call was sent to Rev. John Marshall.
- 18 Nov. 1917 Rev. J. Marshall preached his first sermon.
- 24 Aug. 1919 Rev. J. Marshall's resignation was received to take effect 28 Sept. 1919. (He had accepted a call to Port Burwell, Calton and Lakeview).

- 18 Jan. 1920 Rev. H.W. Bower was given a call to this field.
  29 Feb. 1920 (He began his pastorate).
- 5 Jan. 1921 At a joint meeting of the boards of the Sparta and the First Yarmouth Baptist Churches, held on the evening of January 5th, 1921 in the basement of the Sparta Church, a motion was passed that we call a delegation from each church in the Elgin Association to meet in a conference with us at Sparta on March 14, 1921, for the ordinance of Pastor H. W. Bower.
- 17 Feb. 1924 Rev. H. W. Bower resigned.
- 1924 (Rev. Thomas France, minister 1924, had to resign due to ill health).
- 13 Dec. 1925 A call was voted for Rev. Waddell.
- 20 Dec. 1925 Rev. Waddell commenced pastorate at \$625. per annum.
- 12 Oct. 1930 Clerk read Rev. C. Waddell's resignation, but the matter was laid over to a later date.
- 24 Oct. 1930 Resignation accepted.
- 26 Oct. 1930 Rev. Waddell preached his farewell sermon.
- 21 Dec. 1930 Rev. Edgar Allen preached.
- Spring 1931 (Several ministers preached in view of call).
- 4 May 1931 The deacons of Edward Street, Sparta and First Yarmouth met at the Plains to consider co-operation of the three fields.
- 5 July 1931 An after church meeting was called and a vote was taken for the Plains Church to fall in line with the other churches for Mr. Medley to be our pastor. (The following letter was sent to Rev. Medley) -

"Dear Rev. Medley:

The Plains Church took a vote on July 5th,1931, so as to fall in line with the other churches, as the members had not seen and heard you speak. The members had a talk over the financial part of the church, and it was very low. They decided to close the church until September, and did not want to state the salary that they could pay you. They are

keeping the Sunday school and B.Y.P.U. going. Hoping to hear from you in the near future. Yours truly, G.A. Smith."

6 Sept. 1931 Mr. Medley preached his first sermon.

22 Jan. 1932 Quarterly meeting held at the home of Mr. Wm. Rose. Mrs. Medley occupied the chair as Rev. Medley was absent on account of a tonsil operation. There was a discussion of the minister's salary and it was decided to pay \$5. a Sunday.

31 May 1936 Mr. Medley resigned, to take effect the last of June.

17 Oct. 1936 Rev. J. Maitland Jones given a call to be our minister.

June 1938 Rev. Maitland Jones' resignation to take effect in July.

1 Jan. 1939 Rev. G. Sherman began his pastorate.

16 May 1941 Rev. Sherman's salary \$4. each Sunday.

23 July 1941 Suggested Rev. Mr. Roberts of the Air School be invited to preach some Sunday.

Jan. 1959 It was moved that in order to clear up a technical point, we accept Rev. Sherman's resignation. It was also moved and seconded that Rev. Sherman be our interim pastor until such time as we have a regular pastor.

15 Apr. 1959 Agreed to pay Mr. Sherman \$16.40 per Sunday.

10 May 1959 A motion was made and carried that Iona Baptist Church join with Sparta and Plains for a three point field.

Plains to pay \$15. per Sunday toward new minister's salary.

7 June 1959 It was voted to ask Rev. Seymore Boyce to preach at our church.

15 July 1959 It was voted to call Rev. Seymore Boyce for the three point charge.

26 July 1959 Rev. G.W. Sherman preached his farewell sermon.

9 Aug. 1959 Rev. Seymore Boyce began his pastorate here.

25 Aug. 1963 The clerk read Rev. Boyce's letter of resignation.

29 Sept.1963 Rev. Boyce preached his farewell sermon.

24 Jan. 1964 Vote of thanks extended to Mr. Stewart for his

interim ministry.

- 1964 Mr. Penner began his ministry.
- 15 Apr. 1967 Rev. Anthony Penner read his resignation to the church.
- 11 June 1967 Rev. Penner preached his farewell sermon.
- 8 Oct. 1967 Brian Sherry became our student minister.
- 1 Dec. 1968 Mr. Sherry read his resignation to take effect on the 2 Feb. 1969.
- 1969 Rev. Seymore Boyce filled in for many services.
- Sept.1969 Mr. John Dickinson began his official duties as our pastor.
- 25 June 1972 Rev. John Dickinson ordained.
- 30 Dec. 1973 Rev. John Dickinson preached his farewell sermon. He has accepted a position at Mt. Hope Baptist Church, Hamilton Ontario.
- 3 Mar. 1974 Mr. Gordon Hill began his ministry.
- 13 Apr. 1975 Mr. Gordon Hill was ordained at Sparta.
- 4 Jan. 1976 The letter of resignation of Rev. Gordon Hill was read. He has accepted a call to be associate minister at Walmer Road Church, Toronto, Ontario.
- 4 Apr. 1976 Rev. Gordon Hill preached his farewell sermon. Rev. James Lewis became our interim pastor.
- 9 Sept.1979 Rev. James Lewis preached his farewell sermon. Rev. Malcolm Rust became our interim pastor with his term to end August, 1980.
- 22 June 1980 Rev. Rust agreed to remain as our weekend pastor while he takes a course as an intern chaplain in the Queen Street Mental Health Centre in Toronto. His ambition is to work as a part-time institutional chaplain, continuing to give pastoral leadership to the churches of Plains and Sparta.

### "THROUGH THE YEARS"

A Chronological Description of Events from the Church Minutes 1835-1981

<u>26 Dec. 1835</u> In the year of 1835, the congregation was meeting at the schoolhouse on Lot 8, Concession 5, near William Yorke's.

7 Apr. 1838 Met at the Baptist meeting-house. (No records are available from 1835 - 1838, but I believe that the church was built between 1836 and 1838).

7 Apr. 1838 Voted that Deacon Anderson Montross and Brothers John Lanning and James Brown go to view the condition of the land belonging to the church (Lot 8, Concession 5), and rent the same or a part thereof for said church, as they may think most proper to do.

15 Oct. 1839 (The only mention of the building of the church or meeting-house was in October, 1839);

Met at the meeting-house agreeable to appointment, for the purpose of settling the business of the building
of the meeting-house. Moved that Deacon Montross render his
account to the church, and if he has paid more than his due
the church will remunerate him for overplus. Moved that Deacon
Johnson and Brother J. Lanning act as trustees for building the
meeting-house, and to receive money, and pay out same until it
is finished, as fast as they can collect it.

26 Dec. 1846 Resolved that Deacons Brown and Ellison and Brothers Cyrus Thayer and Christian Minor be a committee to arrange the business of enclosing the meeting-house ground, and repairing the meeting-house.

25 Nov. 1847 Resolved that Deacon Ellison and Brother C. Thayer be a committee to inquire of Brother T. Zavitz if the school lot adjoining the meeting-house lot is obtainable by a good title, and at what price.

6 Jan. 1849 Resolved that the meeting-house shall be underpinned with not less than twelve pillars of stone and to be painted with two good coats of paint on the outside, and that the meeting-house ground shall be enclosed on the north, east

and south sides with good posts and board fence, with a good gate on each side of the meeting-house on the north side. Carried unanimously.

Moved and carried that the brethren meet on Saturday the 13th of January, 1849 at Brother C. Minor's, to procure stone to underpin the meeting-house.

Resolved that Brother John Lanning draw up a subscription list and circulate same for the purpose of building a shed on the west side of the meeting-house ground.

1 Dec. 1855 Resolved that Brother John Lanning and W. G. Parker make an estimate for building a shed.

31 Dec. 1855 Estimate made.

5 Jan. 1856 Decided to delay building shed at present.

4 July 1857 Resolution passed to meet in two weeks time to underpin the meeting-house.

17 Feb. 1859 A tea meeting was held for the purpose of raising money to fence the meeting-house and build a shed. \$52. was collected and \$3. added the next day, making a total of \$55.

24 Jan. 1861 A tea meeting was held for the internal improvement of the meeting-house (making seats).

5 Feb. 1861 A committee including Samuel Smith, Levi Montross, James Vansickle, Enos Scott and Anderson Montross was chosen to superintend the finishing of the inside work of the meeting-house as far as they deem it expedient.

24 Sept.1861 Moved by A. Montross and seconded by Brother C. Minor that Brothers S. Smith and E. Scott get the stoves and pipes, and there be a collection taken up every Sabbath until they are paid for.

7 Nov. 1863 It was decided that the church will take the land enclosed with the meeting-house ground which belongs to William VanHorn, and pay him \$12. for the land. He agrees to allow \$2. of that amount as his part of the pay on said land.

5 May 1868 Moved and seconded that new curtains with rollers be provided for the windows of the meeting-house, and that they be white.

4 May 1869 Moved and seconded that Brother John Lanning see

to the repairing of the roof of the meeting-house.

17 Feb. 1870 A tea meeting was held at the chapel - object; to put a new roof on the chapel, and for repairs and improvements. Collection of \$47.50 was taken up. At a social the following evening \$15.42 was added making a total of \$62.92.

24 Feb. 1870 Resolution to circulate a subscription list, for repairing and enlarging the chapel, to add to the monies previously collected.

3 May 1870 Moved and seconded that Brother E. Simons make a specification for the repairing and alterations of the meeting-house, and present it at a special meeting for that purpose 16 May 1870.

16 May 1870 Moved and seconded that the estimate made by Brother Simons for repairing the chapel be received for further consideration.

Moved and seconded that the house be enlarged 14 feet in length at the south end, and that the windows now in the house be taken out, and new sash and larger glass, say 10" x 14", be put in without altering the shape of the windows Moved and seconded that the seats in the old part remain in position, and that the pulpit be remodelled to suit the minister. That the seats in the additional part be raised in regular rotation to the amount of from 15 to 20 inches in the whole distance.

Moved and seconded that there be a place prepared for an organ. Moved and seconded that there be two chimneys instead of one for the stoves.

Moved and seconded that a building committee of three be appointed. Upon further consideration a committee of five appointed, namely, Rev. Thomas Mills, Samuel Smith, Simon Montross, Benjamin Harvey, John Warburton.

1 Oct. 1870 Moved and seconded that the plan given by Brother J. Molaskey for placing the organ in the chapel be adopted.

15 Nov. 1870 Moved and seconded that Brother Simons be

authorized to procure springs and pulleys, as he thinks best, and put them on the two front doors to secure them being properly closed during the time of services. To be paid out of church funds.

- 3 Dec. 1870 Moved that an effort be made to procure an organ for the use of the church, not to cost more than \$100. Monies to be raised by subscription and at a tea meeting.
- 5 Jan. 1871 Tea meeting was held to raise funds for an organ. \$65.56.
- 6 Jan. 1871 Social raised \$13. and applied to debt on chapel. Debt remaining on chapel a trifling amount was contributed. The debt now paid in full.
- 9 Jan. 1871 Moved and seconded that the organ be accepted, provided said organ is warranted, say for five years, and repairs or another one given in place of it that is good.
- 7 Feb. 1871 A guarantee was requested from Brother Molaskey before the balance due of \$87. was sent to him.

Moved and seconded that the church receive the report of the building committee, as settled with Brother E.D. Simons, as satisfactory, and hereby release the committee.

6 May 1871 Moved and seconded that the report of Deacon Smith, of his dealings with Brother Molaskey re; organ, was received as satisfactory.


There was \$8. realized for the old windows and sash, and \$1. for the old door. This transaction approved.

6 Feb. 1872 Moved and seconded to have a tea meeting to raise funds for painting the chapel.

- 7 May 1872 Moved and seconded that John Lanning do the labour, for painting the outside of the chapel, for \$15. two coats on old part, one coat on the new and one coat on the window sash.
- 4 Jan, 1873 Tea meeting was proposed to raise funds for chapel furnishings.
- 21 Jan. 1873 Tea meeting enjoyed. (Sum raised not in minutes).

  22 Jan. 1873 Social held. (Amount raised not in minutes).

1 Feb. 1873 Moved and seconded that a sofa and tassel for the pulpit, a carpet for both aisles and a chandelier be bought for the chapel, and if any money left a communion service be purchased.



- 6 May 1873 Moved and seconded that Deacon Smith, John Lanning and H. Johnson be a committee for inquiry and purchase of an additional piece of land to the burying ground.
- 2 Feb. 1876 Moved and seconded that Brother Holmes be paid a rate of \$12. per annum from date for heating, sweeping, dusting and lighting the meeting-house and cleaning the lamps 8 Feb. 1876 Tea meeting held raised \$78.71.
- 2 Mar. 1876 Moved and seconded that \$63. of above funds go to the pastor's salary.
- 3 July 1883 We will have half interest in the parsonage 30

property bought by the churches of Sparta and First Yarmouth on the 15th of June, 1883 for the sum of \$450. Our determination; to take up a collection every Lord's Day.

3 Oct. 1883 Moved and seconded that we instruct our pastor to act for us in the matter, and have any necessary improvements made on the parsonage, and that we, by this our action, assume half of the cash cost of such improvements. Moved and seconded that our pastor be paid \$12. as our half of parsonage repairs.

15 Jan. 1884 Moved and seconded that the parsonage be free to Pastor J. B. Davidson this year.

2 Apr. 1884 Committee to procure material for painting the meeting-house.

21 Jan. 1886 Sold the parsonage for \$200.

5 June 1888 Purchased two stoves for \$21.

9 Apr, 1907 Moved and seconded that H. G. Smith look after lumber for partition in shed.

20 Feb. 1908 Meeting called to discuss repairing church. Decided to postpone repairs.

12 Jan. 1909 Mr. George Smith was appointed to arrange for the church being insured.

17 Jan. 1911 Report of Concert Club was read and was decided that the balance in treasurer's hands would be used for lighting the church. The Rev. St.Delmas was appointed to arrange for lamps.

16 Jan. 1912 A committee was appointed to estimate the cost of repairing and to decide site for church. The committee were as follows: Mr. Flemming, Mr. James Liddle, Mr. H. Shipley, Mr. George Smith, Rev. St. Delmas and Mr. Charles White.

A meeting was called for the purpose of presenting the advisability of borrowing \$500. from the Church Edifice Board. It was decided that the church borrow the said sum and place a mortgage on the property for same. It was decided to insure the church for \$1,000. and H. G. Smith was given the power to insure same.

### Information from Violet (Liddle) Colhoun

### Description Pre Renovations 1912

It was a long low white clapboard building with large windows, two at the south end and three on each side. These windows were plain glass through which the sun blazed, nearly blinding the congregation on bright sunny days.


A plank platform or porch stretched across the front, with a stepping platform to aid getting into the buggies at the north west corner. There was no basement, just a few stones for a foundation.

Inside there were two aisles, with narrow seats on the window sides and wider seats in the middle. There was a low platform about three feet deep, with red curtains, on either side at the south end, with the pulpit in the middle. The choir chairs were at the west side, and a little five octave pump organ at the back of the platform. The communion table was located in front of the middle seats. A huge box stove was back near the doors, and a series of stove pipes went the length of the building to the chimney. Bracket coal oil lamps were placed near the windows.


A long drive shed was located west of the meeting-house from the Sparta Road back the length of the lot to the line fence at the south. No trees of any kind grew on the lot.

### Renovations


The building was raised, a basement dug and a foundation poured. Cement blocks were laid and a cement basement floor poured. The peak of the roof was raised, tin roofing was put on the inside walls. Coloured pebble-glass windows were installed. The back windows were closed off and a vestibule built on the front. The builder put the vestibule on the front, off centre. This caused some discussion but still remains. A pantry was walled off at the south end of the basement. A baptistry was built in at that time.




The Interior Before Renovations

- 13 Jan. 1916 On motion Brother VanVelzor was authorized to get fastenings for doors and windows.
- 4 Jan. 1917 A report was read showing that the church piano was paid for. A vote of appreciation was extended to Mrs. Charles White for her valued work in securing funds for the piano. A motion was passed granting Isaac Vanvelzor \$18. for lighting the fires in 1916, and that he be paid same in 1917.
- 16 Jan. 1920 Report of Secretary-treasurer of the Building Committee was read and approved. The church debt was paid and a balance of \$7.36 remained on hand. Church auditors were appointed to audit the building fund accounts.
- 4 Jan. 1923 Motion was passed authorizing trustees to arrange for repairing church building.
- 29 June 1926 A thank you was extended to the Young People's Association for carpet.
- 12 Oct. 1926 Mr. Mansell to procure material for lamps.

  J. Parker to procure gas and oil for same.
- 5 Apr. 1927 Mr. Rose and Mr. Utman are to arrange for a lock for the front door. Trustees to replace broken windows.
- Oct. 1927 William Rose to build fires at a salary of \$25. Discussion in regard to church shed.
- 14 Nov. 1927 Deacons and clerk met at the home of G. Mansell and decided to consider advisability of co-operating with the New Convention of Regular Baptist Churches of Ontario and Quebec.
- 27 Nov. 1927 Thirty-two members present at meeting to consider co-operating with New Convention. Minutes taken by Rev. Waddell and copied in minute book by Miss J. A. Frank. Difference of opinion on how the vote to be taken. Decided to stand rather than cast ballots.

Twenty members stood and so declared determination to continue in the Convention of Regular Baptists of Ontario and Quebec. Ten stood and declared their intention of co-operating with the New Convention. Thus by a two-thirds

majority, the First Yarmouth Baptist Church remains loyal to the Convention.

The following positions were then resigned; the clerk, who also served as a Sunday school teacher, a deacon, who also held offices of secretary-treasurer and Sunday school super-intendant, and a deacon who also held position of Sunday school teacher. It was stated that all resignations would be final.

Treasurer is to have books audited before church will accept them.

The resignation of the above officers made it necessary to call a business meeting on Thursday, December 1st, at 8 p.m. at the church to appoint new officers and re-organize the church in order to carry on in future.

A vote of thanks was to be tendered to the retiring officers for their faithfulness in serving in the church for many years.

1 Dec. 1927 Meeting took place with the pastor in the chair making a forceful appeal that although few in numbers, each member should walk in daily life above reproach, and not to forget that prayer is the strongest weapon.

Resignation also of the organist, who also acted as Sunday school teacher, was read. Accepted.

It was decided to appoint new officers then, instead of waiting until the annual business meeting. This was done. It was decided to meet again on Monday evening with Mr. Senior to receive further instructions. Also, to make plans for the Christmas concert. Decided to ask Union's orchestra if they will come free. Discussion, re; deacon's meeting to arrange bank account; laid over.

Audited books show \$135.46 deficit in pastor's salary. Canvas to be taken of members and adherents to raise the deficit.

Two church lamps to be taken to 'Davey's' to be repaired. Men to meet with William Collins who offered services to help reinforce church shed.

- 5 Jan. 1928 New minute book to be purchased.
- 10 Jan. 1928 Union United Church has given us a gasoline lamp. Letter of appreciation sent. Discussion to draw gravel to fill in driveway.
- 3 June 1928 Trees offered by Clayton Axford to be planted by William Rose.
- 24 Feb. 1929 Meeting to be held Tuesday p.m., re; subject of hydro for the church.
- 17 Mar. 1929 Estimate discussed. Mr. Fisher of Aylmer given the contract for installing the hydro.
- 24 Mar. 1929 Meeting to sign contract for turning on hydro. Those offering to do so; William Rose, trustee, C. Fleming, deacon, and Miss A. Frank, clerk.
- 2 Apr. 1929 Discussion re; shingles that had blown off.
  Trustees to take necessary steps to get shingles and ridge board, and to have them replaced.
- 14 May 1929 E. White to buy new collection plates.
- 18 Oct. 1929 Discussion re; buying four cords of wood @ \$2.50 a cord, as no one seems able to draw wood. Laid over.
- 15 July 1932 Cost of shingling church \$98.
- 7 Jan. 1934 Trustees instructed to get new furnace pipes and see about changing glass in windows.
- 10 July 1935 Left to trustees to fix shed.
- Nov. 1936 Proceeds from selling church shed \$30. Two tons of coal purchased for \$25. on time.
- 1 May 1940 Thanks given to those who helped in fixing the basement.
- 23 July 1941 Moved that the vestibule of the church be painted. Committee to attend to this Miss Clara Utman, Mrs. Roy Parks and R. Williams.
- 20 Oct. 1941 Vestibule of the church completed and committee reported \$25. was paid for work done. Discussion on repairing windows and cement blocks on church.
- 6 Feb. 1942 Moved to take collection first Sunday of each month to make an extra offering for the building fund. Clayton Axford to plant trees on church grounds. Mr. Williams gave \$1.

for old organ.

- Jan. 1944 Discussion on building a toilet.
- 6 Apr. 1945 Mr. Rose to see 'Medlyn's' about spraying the interior of the church.
- 19 Oct. 1945 Decided to pay for tuning piano by collection. Decided to buy a Yale lock for door. Left to trustees about decorating church.
- 26 Apr. 1946 Left to trustees to see Central United Church trustees, re; purchasing their furnace.
- 14 Jan. 1953 Clayton Axford and Mr. Esseltine to plant trees in church yard. Mr. Rose to enquire about eavestroughs from Mr. Gillard.
- 10 Feb. 1954 Thanks sent to Doug Gillard for \$25. discount on eavestroughs.
- 1 Feb. 1955 Discussion on repairs to rear windows.
- 1 Feb. 1956 Decided to put tile floor in basement. Suggested we improve roadway into the church. Mr. Rose gave the report that the township took a corner of the church property to widen the road.
- Jan. 1958 It was decided that Larry Axford and Verne Higgs begin work on the chimney and cement blocks.
- Jan. 1959 The Ladies' Aid reported the building of new cupboards in the kitchen and purchasing of new dishes during the year.
- 28 Sept.1959 Verne Higgs gave a report on building of new chimney and installation of a new hydro circuit into the building. It was decided to have a bee to tear out old furnace and cook stove immediately. New one to be installed as soon as possible.
- 2 Mar. 1960 The reports were given with note being made that a new furnace was installed by the church, with the Sunday school taking over the redecorating of the basement. The Ladies' Aid helped with both projects financially.
- May 1960 The interior of the church has taken on a 'new look'. The men of the church painted the walls and ceiling, laid new tile and bought new blinds. Mr. John Collins built 38

an illuminated cross which has been placed over and behind the pulpit.

15 May 1960 Rev. Seymore Boyce rededicated the building. Moved that the trustees obtain advice of a lawyer to look after the deeds of the cemetery and church.

24 Jan. 1961 Moved that the trustees and Clayton Axford be impowered to go into the matter of raising money for an organ.

14 May 1961 Special services were held at 3 p.m. to dedicate new organ.

1964 During the year 1964 the communion table was dedicated in the church. The inscription is as follows:
"To the Glory of God and In Loving Memory of Alice M. Higgs"
Donated by Kenneth and Mary Lou Pearson.

1969 The inside of the church was renovated with the installation of wall panelling, painting of walls and ceiling trim and the installation of new pews and pulpit. The purchase of the pews and pulpit was made by Verne Higgs from a United Church three miles west of Tillsonburg on the north side of Hwy. 3. They were fitted and installed by Gordon Axford. The expenses for panelling etc. were met by individual donations and a walk sponsored by the Young People's Association. The walk earned \$331.50.

A picture of the Last Supper was painted by and donated to the church by Arthur Lang, Senior.

The original pulpit was placed in the Sunday school when the newer one was purchased.

A communion set was donated to the church by Ivy Green.

22 Jan. 1971 Thanks were expressed to those who worked on the church and cemetery lawns, to Keith Axford for his work with B.Y.P.U., to Verne Higgs for his service to the Sunday school, to Wendy Higgs for her work with the choir, to Doris Carter for cleaning the church and to Gordon Axford for carpentry work he had done.

27 June 1971 During the service thanks was expressed to Mrs. Lena Axford for the gift of a new front door, and to Gordon Axford for installing it. A silver communion set was returned

to the church by the George Smith family. It was used by the church during the late 1800's and early 1900's.

Fall 1971 A new roof was installed this fall and paid for by donations from members and adherents.

10 Jan. 1973 Decided to purchase the new hymn books. Mrs. Clayton Axford gave a generous donation toward them.

1976 The entry of the church was panelled and a new light was installed. Those who worked on the project were; Gordon Axford, Dan Dale, Art Lang, Ken Axford and Harvey Barrett.

19 Jan. 1978 It was reported by the Ladies' Aid that Dan Dale had been asked to give a price on panelling the basement.

Apr. 1978 The church basement has been panelled, a tile ceiling installed and a new rug put down. The Ladies' Aid donated \$800. toward the work. Dan Dale, besides doing the work, donated towards it with his labours. A building fund has been started to pay off the remaining debt.

24 Jan. 1979 The Ladies' Aid reported the purchase of a new stove and refrigerator.

24 Jan. 1980 Doris Carter who has served as caretaker for twenty years resigned and was replaced by her grandson, Paul Higgs. Sincere thanks was expressed for her faithfulness to her work for all those years.

29 May 1980 Twenty additional hymnals have been purchased. Forty New International bibles have also been purchased.

1 June 1980 A dedication service was held this morning in memory of Lena Axford, Norman Higgs, William Higgs and Wayne Ruddock. Verne Higgs spoke briefly on the lives of these people and the parts they had played in our church. Rev. M. Rust then asked the congregation to stand while he dedicated the new piano in the names of the above. The newly upholstered choir chairs were dedicated to the memory of Wayne Ruddock. There were new hymnals dedicated in the name of Harold Axford who died 2 Feb. 1980. The new bibles were also dedicated.

<u>During 1979 - 1980 - a Tuesday morning Bible Study</u> brought together some of the younger women of both congregations.

A very successful chicken barbeque was organized in July, 1980 to benefit church funds.

Since September, 1980, a <u>Friday night group</u>, meeting on alternate weeks, has been attended by young adults from both churches.

A <u>newsletter</u> has been published monthly since April, 1980. Sunday congregations have increased in the past year from an average of 30 to 40 to an average of 80 to 100. A church meeting in February voted in favour of erecting a new church building to celebrate the 150th Anniversary.

### 10 January 1970

The church was saddened by the death of Clayton Axford, as the result of an accident. He will be greatly missed in both the church and the Sunday school because of his dedicated service.

### 21 June 1970

During Anniversary services at the 3:30 celebration, a plaque was placed at the back of the church by the family of the late Clayton Axford.

The poem 'To the First Yarmouth Baptist Church', which was written by him, was inscribed on the plaque.

### OTHER BRANCHES

#### A BLACK CHURCH

1838 - Request by the coloured brethren for delegates to sit in council in St. Thomas on Wednesday the 15th, to examine, and if thought proper, to organize into a body.

#### NEW SARUM

- 22 Jan. 1838 Request delegates to sit in council at the Union schoolhouse, near Hosea Baker's (Lot 19, Concession 8, Yarmouth Township), on Monday the 19th of February to set apart the Yarmouth brethren into a separate church from Malahide. First council meeting for this purpose 1837.
- 28 Dec. 1844 Moved by Brother Donald McIntosh and seconded by Nathan Mills that Deacons Anderson Montross and Nelson VanBuskirk and Brethren William Yorke, Anderson Montross Jr. and John Lanning, be trustees for the church in receiving the deed for the Baptist Second Meeting-House in Yarmouth.

#### DEXTER

- 15 May 1866 Moved by Samuel Smith and seconded by John Lanning that the brethren and sisters living near Dexter, and baptized on May 20th, 1866, shall be permitted to form a branch at Dexter along with such brothers and sisters who live in that vicinity.
- 21 Aug. 1866 Brethren and sisters request to be set off as a branch was granted.
- 19 Dec. 1875 Dexter was given the right to receive candidates for Christian baptism.
- 6 Jan. 1885 The motion that was made on May 15th, 1866, setting Dexter off as a branch of this church, be recinded.

#### SPARTA

4 May 1869 - Moved and seconded that this church is willing to co-operate with the members of this church, living in the vicinity of Sparta, at such time as they make request to do so

to set them off as a branch of this church, or to organize them into a church and assist them in doing so, and mutually to co-operate with them in the ministry for a time. 11 Oct. 1869 - Statement made by J. W. McDiarmid regarding proceeding at Sparta, re; purchasing the cite and building the chapel.

17 Oct. 1869 - Transfer of members took place. Several who transferred from Malahide to Plains and then to Sparta were:

John McDiarmid and his wife Christine Peter McDiarmid and his wife Parmilla Archibald McDiarmid Anselletta Walrath

John McDiarmid Jr.

Those transferring from the Plains to Sparta were:

John Bates Anderson Montross Lydia Montross Willard Mills Samuel Crumb Emeline Minard Amelia Dangerfield Beatrice Dangerfield Henry Daugerell Eliza Daugerell Hugh McDiarmid John Grice Jane Dangerfield Mary Minard Marcilla Dangerfield

21 Aug. 1872 - The committee appointed for arranging the business of the Sparta Church reported that Sparta Baptist, as a church, does not maintain itself. They have given up their Book of Church Record, the Deed of Claim to the land on which the chapel stands and other writings of the claim of their church property, to the Plains for protection and safekeeping for the time being, according to the requirements and provisces in the said deed.

7 Sept.1872 - Sparta made request to have a branch church, so that those unable by age, infirmity and want of conveyance, might have more frequently the privilege of commemorating the love of Christ in the ordinance of the Lord's Supper. Unanimous consent to this measure naming the third Saturday in the month for the covenant meeting, and the following Sabbath for communion.

25 Mar. 1873 - Special meetings to be held at Sparta as described earlier. Many members were given their letters of transfer to Sparta at that time.

### PREACHING IN OTHER PLACES

- 10 May 1835 Met at the schoolhouse near William Yorke's for business meeting.
- 29 Jan. 1848 Resolved that Brother Lanning visit Elder Mills and request him to give explanation to the church of his appointment of meetings at the schoolhouse. (Many times mention was made of preaching at the meeting-house in the morning and at the schoolhouse in the afternoon. I presume this was Seminary School but have no proof).
- 26 June 1859 Elder Gonne attended and preached at the meeting-house in the forenoon, and at the Dexter school-house in the afternoon.
- 10 July 1859 Elder Gonne preached at the Widdifield school-house.
- 2 May 1869 The Rev. R.A. Fyfe being present and preached at the schoolhouse S.S. #13.
- 13 June 1869 Meeting at S.S. #13, afterwhich, baptisms were performed in Catfish Creek.

On March 5th, 1876, it was moved by Brother Holmes, and seconded by <u>Sister Holmes</u> that the church pay Deacon Smith \$1. for money paid by him to Jesse Haight for work done in the grave-yard.

This is the first time a woman took part in, a or at least was recorded as seconding a motion a in a business meeting).

#### BAPTISMS

The following is a list of Baptisms that have been recorded in the Church records. There are omissions to this list as there are many years when no Baptisms have been recorded. The following are the only records available.

Baptisms took place throughout the area before the Baptistry was installed in the Church. The earliest Baptism took place the day the Church became a branch of Iona. Later Baptisms took place in Catfish Creek, a mill pond, Sparta Church and New Sarum Church.

On August 17th, 1860 a hail storm knocked the windows out of the meeting house. On September 2nd, a collection was taken up to purchase glass to put in the windows.

On Thursday, the 6th of December (Thanksgiving Day), 1860 Elder Isaac J. Rice preached.

In May, 1870, when the church was enlarged, a place was prepared for an organ.

On February 7th, 1871, the choir was first mentioned. "It was moved and seconded that the pastor meet with the choir, say at Mr. Scott's, and confer with them as to the manner of conducting the music."

A Tea Meeting was held on May 5th, 1871, to raise funds for an organ. 1917 was the year the new piano was purchased, and in 1942, the old organ was sold for \$1.

In 1961, a new organ was dedicated, and that same year, the choir held a strawberry social to raise money for material for new choir gowns.

New hymn books were purchased in 1973, and in 1980 a new piano was dedicated.

The choir, under the direction of Mrs. Wendy Lessard, has fourteen members, meets regularly every Thursday evening and regularly contribute to the Sunday morning worship service. The junior choir also sing occasionally. Guest musicians are welcomed from time to time. Both organ and piano accompany the singing each Sunday morning.

### TO THE MEMORY OF LENA GERTRUDE AXFORD

Lena spent her entire lifetime attending this church. Born in 1904, she began as Sunday school pianist at age of nine and continued as church pianist until it was taken over by her granddaughter, Wendy Higgs, in 1966.

She reorganized the choir in 1959, and the choir was constantly touring to various churches within a hundred mile radius. She remained faithful to the Plains after the split in 1927.

She was often a representative to the annual Baptist assemblies. She spent many hours doing the work of the church, and died in 1974. Her descendants still play an active roll in the Plains today.

On January 21st, 1866, consent was given to allow a singing school to be held in the meeting-house, provided no misconduct in house.



### THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday school has always been an active part of the church. In 1842, there were 106 members attending Sunday school.

On the 15th of May, 1866, the Sunday school reported having; seven teachers, thirty-five pupils and a small lib-rary.

The Sunday school meets at 11 a.m. following the morning service except in July and August. Special events include; a Christmas party, summer picnic, and skating and tobogganing parties.

# THE LADIES' AID

The First Yarmouth (Plains) Baptist Ladies' Aid had it's beginning as a Baptist Mission Circle, when it was organized at the home of Mrs. Harold Parker, Fourth Concession, South Yarmouth, in May, 1930.

Organizer and first president was Mrs. Charles Waddell, wife of the late Rev. Waddell who was pastor of the church at the time. There were about twenty-five members and Mrs. Waddell held the presidency throughout the duration of her husband's pastorate.

Money raised by the group went largely to home and foreign Baptist missions. A few years after formation, the group was re-organized as a Baptist Ladies' Aid. While they are still mission minded, and meet their allotment, they also aid the work of the church in numerous ways.



## HISTORY OF THE SEMINARY BURYING GROUND by Donald Lanning

On the 17th of October 1856 an indenture or Deed of Bargain and Sale and Trust was witnessed by Benjamin C. Doan, John Lanning and Randolph Johnson.

The purchase price was & 10 of lawful money of Canada paid by the trustees; E. Morgan, S. Preffer, G.E. Minor, C. Burgess, and R. Johnson, of the Seminary Burying Ground for five-eighths of an acre of land to Ezekiel Dennis of the Town of Rockford, Illinois, U.S.A.

Many of the pioneers of the area were interred at Seminary. The earliest burials in the early 1820's. George Lawton who taught school at Seminary, who was also noted for his activities in the Rebellion of 1838, and is the progenitor of the Lawtons of South Yarmouth, is buried here. Richard Lanning is also buried here. He was the first of the Lannings to arrive in this district. Many of the Parkers who came to South Yarmouth in 1816 were also laid to rest here.

The Women's Institute of South Yarmouth, as a project in the 1930's, decided to have this cemetery grounds cleaned up and levelled. The moveable tombstones were cleared off and the land was worked up by Covil Lanning and his team of horses. The stones were reset to a blueprint (in the possession of Charles Lawton) under the supervision of George Pearce, caretaker of the Union Cemetery. Later that year Mr. Pearce sowed grass seed, much to his displeasure only the sweet clover grew. As a result the grounds were burned off usually once a year. I can remember that pheasants were very numerous for a few years and many nests were ravaged by the burn off.

Claude VanVelzer, who lived in this community, volunteered to clean up the grounds in the 1950's and worked far beyond the call of duty to make the place a little more respectable.

Charles Lawton, William Langand Donald Lanning were a committee appointed a few years before the Seminary School closed in June 1968, to be in charge of moneys available from the township in paying for the upkeep of the cemetery. Robert Chilton is now keeping the grass cut. It is interesting to note that in years gone by the township has widened their roads and the west fence now crosses some of the lots.

## HISTORY OF FIRST YARMOUTH (PLAINS) BAPTIST CEMETERY (NEW PART)

#### By Verne Higgs

Up to the early 1960's, Fairview Avenue lined up directly with the Church building necessitating a left and right turn to proceed south on this road. Elgin County bought land on the east side of Fairview Avenue, which commenced south of Beaver Creek and swung Fairview Avenue to the east, thus lining it up with the southern portion. It also necessitated them taking a small north east corner of the Church property. This left an unused piece of property on the north west corner of Fairview Avenue, and Sparta Road #27; 192.2' x 66' adjoining the cemetery located there.

Because the old cemetery was unkept rough terrain, full of shoemac, had no plan of lots or records of burials, and half the tombstones were in disrepair, Verne Higgs decided to acquire this new strip of land, make a proper engineered plan, get a proper license for a new cemetery, and close the old cemetery. Since that time there have been a few burials in the old part, namely; Clayton Axford, Lena Axford, Vince MacDonald, Vera VanVelzer, James Williams and Emma Parker.

Verne Higgs contacted Robert Moore, County Engineer, and made a deal with him to remove the hill on the north west corner of Fairview Avenue, and Sparta Road; pay \$125. in costs, and a few other concessions, in exchange for this strip of land.

On November 6th, 1963 a deed from the Corporation of the Township of Yarmouth signed by Reeve, Mason Tansley and Clerk, Leonard Olde, to the trustees of the First Regular Baptist Church in Yarmouth, naming; Norman Higgs, Arthur Lang, Verne Higgs and Edward Green, was given for a strip of land 192.' x 66'.

Higgs and Higgs Ltd., supplied a bulldozer which was operated by Larry Axford, Glen Summers, Gary Higgs and Wayne Higgs. The lot was stripped and filled in places up to six feet deep, the hill was removed, shoemac cut, old iron fence around one plot removed. Clayton Axford and Verne Higgs removed some of the stones and replaced them after the excavation. The following year Donald I. Houghton, Ontario Land Surveyor, prepared a proper plot plan naming 276 lots 3'x10' with 2' walkways east and west, and 3' walkways north and south. Don left engineered stakes at 24' intervals along the western line. Verne Higgs contacted a Mr. J. Reed McAllister, with the Ministry of Sanitary Environment in Toronto, who was in charge of cemeteries. He required the

- following: 1. Copy of deed.
  - Plot plans.
     Letter of approval from St.Thomas Health Unit.
  - 4. A copy of the resolution passed by Yarmouth Township, which was moved by Councillor, Cliff Young and seconded by Councillor, Sam McLorn and signed by Reeve, Dave Cook, that permission be granted to the Church to use this
  - property for burying purposes 1968.


    5. A bylaw for use of cemetery rules and regulations.
  - 6. A trustee account for perpetual care (Public Trustee, 145 Queens St., West,
  - Toronto, Ontario).
  - 7. Reporting schedule (form 2).
  - 8. Copy of deed to issue to plot owners.

After countless correspondence, nothing seemed to get done until H.C. Fletcher, an inspector from the newly named Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations, Cemeteries Branch, 353 Richmond Street, London, Ontario, came to Verne Higg's office in July, 1972. He assisted Mr. Higgs in preparing our rules and regulations, filled out some past due forms, inspected the cemetery and found it in beautiful order. He then sent these new forms off to Toronto and this resulted in more correspondence; i.e. January, 1973.

September 25th, 1975 our certificate 75-1-20 was issued. Up to 1980 there have been five burials in the new part.

The congregation of the First Yarmouth Baptist Church took over control of the old cemetery from Yarmouth Township in 1963. Different people were hired to mow the cemetery up to 1969. In 1969 the Church bought three push lawnmowers and since then a few of the faithful members, spearheaded by Keith Axford and Harvey Barrett have kept both Church and cemetery lawns cut beautifully. In the early 1970's, Wayne Higgs bought a six foot wide power mower for his farm tractor, and has since, with the help of Verne Higgs Jr., done the bulk cutting, leaving the close cutting and trimming to the rest.

Yarmouth Township has granted \$50. per year for maintenance of the old cemetery, and in 1979 raised it to \$100. per year.

A PIONEER HISTORY OF ELGIN COUNTY
